Community Health Worker

The Community Health Worker Core Skills Training Program is a certificate program that can be completed in 9-12 weeks. The program prepares and trains individuals for a career in health care as a community health worker. According to the American Public Health Association, "community health workers (CHWs) serve as a link between social services and the community to facilitate access to services and improve the quality and cultural competence of service delivery. Since CHWs typically reside in the community they serve, they have the unique ability to bring information where it is needed most. They can reach community residents where they live, eat, play, work and worship. CHWs are frontline agents of change, helping to reduce health disparities in underserved communities." Community Health Workers can seek employment with local health authorities, community based organizations, schools and healthcare agencies including hospitals, health clinics and independent providers. Community health workers are known by a variety of titles: community health worker, community health representative, promotora, patient navigator, health mentor, patient advocate, etc. The Community Health Worker Program is an approved program with the State of Utah Department of Health. Upon the successful completion of coursework, students receive a certificate from Utah State University and from the Utah Department of Health, Healthy Living through Environment, Policy and Improved Clinical Care Program (EPICC). The USU Certified Nursing Assistant Program complies with the State of Utah Department of Health requirements for core skill competencies for Community Health Workers. Students successfully completing the program will be well prepared for a career as a Community Health Worker.

Community Health Worker Entrance Requirements

Utah State University has an open admission policy. Applicants will be admitted without regard to race, color, religion, sex, national origin, age, disability, or veteran's status. In addition, discrimination on the basis of sexual orientation for employees in all aspects of employment and for students in academic programs and activities is prohibited. An English skills level 6 is recommended to be successful in this program. However, instruction and tutoring in Spanish and Navajo will be provided to support successful completion. No other educational pre-requisites are required. Acceptance into this program will be by the selection process.

General Admissions Procedures

To be officially admitted to the college as a full-time matriculated student, an applicant must submit the following:

- 1. Must be at least 16 years of age before beginning the program.
- 2. A completed Application for Admission.
- 3. There is no application fee or cost of admission to individuals selected to participate in this program.
- 4. Must hold primary residence in state of Utah.
- 5. Optional: Provide a letter of recommendation.
- 6. Optional: Provide a resume.

Notification of acceptance and resident status will be sent from the Community Health Certificates Host Site Coordinator. If a student's application is incomplete at the time of registration, the student will not be admitted to the program. **This program is free of cost to those selected to participate.**

Students with Disabilities

If a student has a disability that qualifies under the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) and requires reasonable accommodation, that student should contact the Disability Resource Center for information on appropriate policies and procedures. Disabilities covered by ADA may include learning, sensory, emotional, physical or medical impairments.

Final Practicum Project Preparation

Prior to initiating any community practicum externship, students are required to complete and submit to their facilitator all five preparatory assignments for the final project and attend an orientation with the appropriate sites that they will be partnering for their final project. For individuals partnering with a health clinic or healthcare provider for their final project, they may be required to complete additional background screenings and immunizations per the site's requirements.

^{*}Throughout the course, students will complete five preparatory assignments to develop a final clinical/community based practicum or externship.
